From the Historian:

HISTORICALLY SPEAKING

PART II: THE CORPS OF ENGINEERS DURING THE CIVIL WAR

In my first installment I covered the early years of the Corps:

- 1776 when GEN Washington named COL Richard Gridley as the first Chief Engineer
- 1802 when Thomas Jefferson established West Point and made the Corps of Engineers a permanent branch of the Army,
- 1838 when Congress split the Corps by establishing a separate Corps of Topographical Engineers with the Engineer Department
- 1863 when the Corps of Topographical Engineers was disbanded

It was a sign of the times in the years leading up to the Civil War that a large standing Army met with more than a little distrust by many of states (especially Southern states) who tended to rely on home bred militias and volunteer forces. When the Corps combined again in 1863 it had

forty-six officer positions, only 20 of which were filled with the other 26 already gone home to serve with the Volunteer Forces or on State Army staffs.

One of the more notable to defect was then COL Robert E. Lee who resigned his West Point commission in the Corps of Engineers on 20 April 1861, two days after Virginia had seceded from the Union. Lee was appointed commander of Virginia's forces with the rank of major general and the next year assumed command of the Army of Northern Virginia. He quickly turned the tables on Union General George B. McClellan, as he would several other commanders of the Army of the Potomac. His brilliance as a battlefield tactician earned him a place among the great military leaders of all time.

P. G. T. Beauregard is another example of a Corps of Engineers officer who was trained at West Point (2nd in his class of 1838) but who left the Union Army to return to his home state of Louisiana to fight for the Confederacy.

The Defenses of Washington became one of the most important Corps of Engineers projects of the Civil War. The forts and the ring road connecting them were designed to protect the capital from the adjacent Confederate states and create near-impregnable fortifications. The Union had some early successes with the capture of Arlington and Alexandria but was unable to prevail at Manassas Junction where the Army of Northern Virginia drove them from the field and back to D.C.

Fortunately for the Union the Confederate leadership failed to see the weakness of the poorly defended line and did not pursue them. For the remainder of the war, roughly 15 engineer officers were employed in Washington's defenses at any given time. By 1862 they had completed 37 forts, and by 1865 the number stood at 68, all within a thirty-seven-mile perimeter connected by trenches and blockhouses with roads leading back to central locations. Although some of the earthen works remain most have been destroyed by the forces of nature and time.

4. HOTEL: The BEACH COVE RESORT, MYRTLE BEACH, SC

- a. The 2020 reunion in Myrtle Beach will be held at the BEACH COVE RESORT.
 - 1) The property consists of 300+ privately owned condominium suites whose rentals are managed by the Resort.
 - 2) All units are ocean front 'suites' that open onto balconies facing the ocean.
 - 3) Each suite has a separate bedroom and is equipped with a full size refrigerator, 2-burner cook top, microwave oven, pots, pans, plates and utensils.
 - 4) The resort property has multiple pools & hot tubs and provides direct access to a wide, sandy beach.
 - 5) Info and photos are available at the resort web site: https://beachcove.com
 - 6) NOTE #1: 2-bedroom suites have only one bathroom.
 - 7) NOTE #2: There are a limited number of handicap accessible suites which should be reserved as soon as possible.

b. Room Rates:

- 1) A 1-BR Suite is \$103.04/night including taxes, resort fee and parking.
- 2) A 2-BR Suite is \$181.44/night including taxes, resort fee and parking.
- 3) NOTE: Since each suite is fully equipped (see above) the room rates do not include breakfast giving you the option to prepare your own. Those who desire can add a full service hot buffet for \$10.95/person/day.

c. Hotel Registration:

- 1) We have blocked a total of 25 rooms at the Beach Cove Resort.
- 2) These rooms will be available at the negotiated rate and guaranteed for up to 3 days prior to and 3 days after the reunion for those who want to come early or stay late.
- 3) Any rooms not reserved by 1 Sept 2020 will be released.
 - a) Please make your HOTEL reservations by phone (DO NOT REGISTER ON LINE):
 - b) Call 1-800-331-6533. Select Option 2 then select Option 1.
 - c) Ask for the "11th & 547th Engr Bn Reunion" and specify the type room desired.

d) There is a 1 night deposit required when you book but this is fully refundable provided you cancel at least one week prior to your arrival date. If extraordinary circumstances require you to cancel after that time I will work this with the Resort.

d. Cancellations:

5. GROUP ACTIVITY (FRIDAY, 2 OCT 2020)

- a. This day will be busy but provides a wonderful excursion into "old" South Carolina.
- b. We will board our motor coach at 9 AM en route to Georgetown, SC, aka "Little Charleston". Our tour guide will provide a commentary along the way highlighting the unique history and attributes of the area. Georgetown is a beautiful and historic environment of centuries old Live Oak trees lining streets adorned by 50+ antebellum mansions, art galleries and antique shops.
- c. The first stop (about 10 AM) will be at the Georgetown Veterans Memorial where our Chaplains will lead a joint 11th/547th Memorial Service and unveil our Memorial Pavers.
- d. After the Memorial Service (about 10:30) we will board the bus for a tour of historic Georgetown with a stop at one or two historically significant sites.
- e. We will stop for lunch about noon in the Georgetown Historic District and Boardwalk. Here you can stroll down Main Street, visit the many shops and museums and stop for lunch at one of the varied eateries along the way. Some highlights include: The Rice Museum/Clock Tower and Museum Shop, The (Free) Maritime Museum celebrating Georgetown being South Carolina's 2nd largest Port, a casual stroll down Front Street or on The Harborwalk to take in the views. WHAT IS INVOLVED: Local expert Zada Mae will lead the class and bring everything needed to help you unleash your inner creativity to design and make your own hand-woven long needle pine basket. A fun activity, no former weaving experience is needed!

HISTORY: Pine needle basketry, conceived by Native Americans in Pre-Columbian times, is part of our American cultural heritage. Employing ancient techniques using long-leaf pine needles, this art form has remained virtually the same for thousands of years. It has evolved into the 21st century, bringing with its connections to our past a contemporary need to preserve our natural resources and appreciate our planet's gifts to mankind. In this region of South Carolina the Seminole, Cherokee, Coushatta and Choctaw American Indian tribes are known for crafting baskets and other items from long-leaf pine needles.

ABOUT THE INSTRUCTOR: Zada Mae was the primary artist for Emerald Bay Trading Company gallery at the nationally known RAIN BARREL artisan village in the Florida Keys and is well known in international basket weaving guilds. Originally from Charleston SC, Zada Mae has been a sweet water grass and pine needle weaver for more than 30 years learning her craft from the Gullah weavers. Zada Mae will provide a short history/overview of pine needle weaving and a handout for each student.

JUNGLE CAT KOREA UPDATE by LTC Rob Dion, Jr., BN CDR / CSM RUSSELL, BN CSM



It has been a busy quarter for the Jungle Cats! The battalion remains ready to fight tonight and win while taking care of Soldiers, KATUSAs, and Families.

- 55th Mobility Augmentation Company (MAC) prepared and conducted a combined arms breach exercise, which included firing a live Mine Clearing Line Charge (MICLIC). This was the first time the battalion has done this since we were activated 2 ½ half years ago.

HUMAN INTEREST CORNER


A human interest story about one of our fellow soldiers:
