11th Engr Bn and HHC:

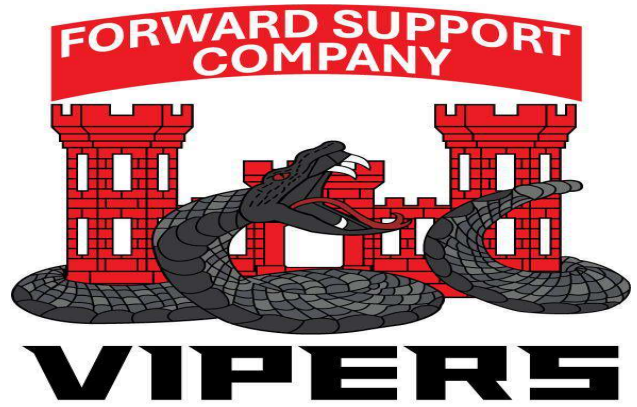

From the Historian:

The 11th Engineer Regiment was activated in 1917 as the United States was planning its entry into WWI. In the 108 years since then, the “Jungle Cats” have been deployed around the world in combat as well as peacetime roles, including:

- World War I (1917 – 1919)
- World War II (1944 – 1946)
- Korea (1950 – 1954)
- Kuwait (1994)
- Iraq (2003)

Between war-fighting deployments, the 11th also served many peacetime deployments in the following locations:

- Panama (1920 – 1932),
- South Korea (1954 - 1971)
- Fort Belvoir, VA (1971 - 1989)
- Fort Stewart, GA (1992 -2004)
- Fort Benning, GA (2007 – 2016) and
- US Army Garrison (Camp) Humphreys (2017 - present).

I am always hunting for bits of history and memorabilia that can shed light and perhaps insights into the 'Jungle Cats' of yesteryear. In this edition I share a rare snapshot of the 11th during WWII just after hostilities ended on VE Day. I say "rare" as this is only the 11th Engineer Battalion newsletter from the WWII time period that I have found to date.

The 11th Engineer Combat Battalion deployed to the European Theater of Operations (ETO) in late 1944. Its missions included typical engineer tasks: clearing minefields, repairing roads, building and repairing bridges, conducting demolition missions and supporting the 101st Cavalry Group's penetration of the Siegfried Line.

Six months after their arrival in theater, on 8 May 1945, Germany surrendered. The 11th remained in Germany for another 18 months carrying out reconstruction projects. The unit was then inactivated in Austria on 30 November 1946, after 24 months in country.

Then called 'The Jungle Cat', the newsletter consisted of four pages, each 9.5" x 12". It is folded in the center (book style) and appears to have been professionally printed. The paper is yellowed and fragile with age but is largely intact. Due to the size, however, I've only included the front page as reducing it to 8 1/2 x 11 makes the print very difficult to read. I will bring this copy to next year's reunion but for now have included the front page and a couple of extracts.

NOTE: The newsletter is dated June 8, 1945, only a month after VE Day. It's not numbered but based on the Editor's comment at the bottom center of the first page, I believe that it is only the 2nd newsletter to be published, likely a result of the Battalion transitioning from a war-time footing to life in Garrison.

I have also provided an update on 11th ball cap availability elsewhere in this newsletter.

We are looking forward to seeing you all in Florida next year!

GÜNZBURG, GERMANY, June 8, 1945

Research Reveals Vino Fuel-Sub

Perhaps these Europeans have something when they say, "Water is only to wash with". The following experience of Pfc Ray Pritchard and T/5 Leonard Dunklee, both of H/S, is a good argument to substantiate their claim.

The boys were coming in from a run in the wee hours with a load of gas and a case of social lubricant, namely: red wine. They had up full steam, when suddenly the head on their gas buggy cracked. Fortunately, or so they thought, they were stalled in a small town, but Pritchard wore out a set of knuckles on all the doors in town with the able assistance of Dunklee, manning the M-1, to no avail. Somehow, not a soul in town was at home that night.

Shells were falling much too close for comfort, so they felt the urge to get on. In one final effort to get water, they searched the surrounding fields, and for the first time in their experience with fox holes, they found each and every one as dry as a bone.

Worst had definitely come to worst. After deep thought, and a couple of small swigs as a brace, they poured the whole case of the crimson vino down the radiator. With a couple of gurgles, they were off and even though the prestone-wine mixture soon began to boil, they rolled into the area in true engineer fashion, leaving behind them a cloud of steam and a celestial aroma. The moral, they say, is this: "Never be without the stuff; you never know when you'll get a snake bite or a cracked head."

H and S Broke Precedent, Built Bad Wiessee Bridge

The shootin' was over an the "lootin' verboten" early in May when Capt. Keller sounded the old army battle cry for "all available men". Thirty Hq & Sv Co stalwarts suddenly found themselves "available" for their most unusual assignment of the war — the construction of a fixed bridge over the far-from-raging waters of a stream that emptied into the Tegern See at Bad Wiessee.

So inclusive was the round-up of man-power that even Hyman (Reichs) Marks, C Co clerk attached to H&S, was spirited away from his typewriter and handed a shovel. At a loss to determine which was the working end of the implement, our hero contented himself with various tasks ranging from water boy to, of all things, nail polisher. It's been a long time since we have seen the left-handed monkey wrench gag pulled with success, but—there it was.

Had you been present that day to watch the flooring of the Lt. Col. West Bridge you'd have seen Cpl Marks proudly feeding hand polished nails to six of our carpenters. When Cpl Aquila complained of rusty nails, declaring them no good for the operation, and asked Marks to clean them up, everybody thought it was a joke—except the little Corporal. Under constant urging to do a better job of shining and cleaning, "Reichs" worked diligently with emery cloth and sand paper for a full half hour before he recognized the hoax. When questioned for a statement

Marks complained, "Gee whiz, I musta been sent".

So—if that particular bridge shines just a little brighter than some others the Battalion has built, we can attribute that fact to Cpl Marks, who probably created a new MOS that day and didn't know it.

The project produced another interesting sidelight with a homespun angle.

T/4 Stanley Jablonski got sawdust in his eye. A serious infection developed so he was trucked off to the 127th Med Det Hospital. He did a double take when he found his brother, a Tech Sgt whom he hadn't seen for almost four years, was the registrar. They spent several days hashing and re-hashing old times, and Jablonski learned that the medic had been in North Africa, Italy, and had only recently moved to Germany. It was through his brother's efforts that T/4 Jablonski was allowed to return to the 11th instead of taking the usual route through a "Repple Depple".

Therein lies another interesting tidbit. Everyone thought Jablonski was gone for good, so the water supply section started some vigorous "polishing" for the rating. In the meantime he went to Bad Wiessee and found us evacuated. He started the long trek to Munich, from there to Augsburg, to Ulm, and finally to Günzburg and back in the fold, but not a minute too soon. T/5 Roy Maness had the stripes in his hands, we are told, when Stanley darkened the door. A rapid cooling-off process was effected immediately.

Well, men, it seems we missed the ball more than somewhat in our first issue, judging by the letters we received from you, and we apologize. From here on in we'll try to give you more of the personal stuff and less of the serious, straight news stories we concentrated on in our initial edition. However, we feel that those personal items should come from you rather than from the limited sources available to our staff. So, here's what we'd like to ask you to do:

If you run across any stories you think are worth printing, write 'em up and send 'em in. Or, if you don't think you can handle 'em, see that your company reporter gets to work. We can't promise to print everything, but we can do our best to insure a fair coverage for all companies. The more reporters and contributors we have, the more interesting stories we'll print — and the better the Jungle Cat will be. How about it?

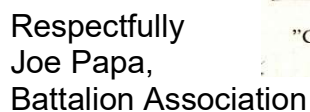

An Extra 15 Minutes to Spare!

Wanting to tour Europe, the sign jumped out at me! It said: **“Join the Army for 3 Years and see the World!”** That sounded reasonable! In 1966 every young male was conscripted into the Military for 6 years. My deal was 3 years Active, and 3 years in the Individual Ready Reserve (IRR). I became a Combat Engineer. In January 1967 my new assignment was to Uijeongbu, Korea. Just a speed bump from the DMZ to Seoul.

Eight months into my assignment found me on the DMZ working on the infrastructure. In the evenings I began to develop a plan for travel. I requested from the First Sergeant (1SG) a 9-day pass. Most Leaves were to Seoul, but when asked, I told him that Hawaii was my destination. After all, I had never visited the USS Arizona Memorial. The 1SG did not like my plan, but reluctantly granted my Leave of Absence.

Taking the bus to the Kimpo Airport, I caught a MAC (Military Air Command) Hop to Osaka, Japan. Only one flight from Osaka to Honolulu was scheduled each week. Securing that ticket, I had 2 days to visit the infamous Ginza, located in Tokyo. I was able to visit the Palace and the botanical gardens.

Upon landing in Honolulu, I immediately signed up for the “once a week” return flight to Japan. As it turned out, my cousin Stan from Arizona lived in Honolulu. He worked for Immigration, he and his wife Colleen had 3 children, 6, 9, and 12. They graciously invited me to stay at their house. Being surrounded by a young family was the highlight of my whole trip. I could not drink enough of the fresh, pure water, nor eat enough of the fresh and sweet pineapple. I visited the USS Arizona Memorial, and Diamond Head. But most of all, I enjoyed my family!

It was time for my return trip to Korea. Stan took me to the Air Base where I learned my Flight had a full manifest with no tickets being issued. Stan then rushed me to the Civilian Airport to see if there were any “No-Shows”. There were two “No-Shows”. My name being the second name called! A line of guys offered to buy my ticket. But No Way! For now, I was on schedule.

Arriving in Japan I went straight to the booth to sign up for Kimpo. A sizeable crowd was there as this flight was overbooked. I requested that my name be added to the list. The next call would be about 3 hours later. With an audible groan, most left for the snack bar. I bought a book to read.

An hour later it was announced that names would be called to fill the boarding manifesto. They called names, and called names, for most everyone was gone. I was the 4th from the last name called. My adventure was becoming exciting, and in no time at all I was landing at Kimpo Airport.

Checking the bus schedule to my destination, I learned that I could arrive within one Camp away, before the 2400 Hour midnight curfew went into effect. I could call to let the Charge of Quarters (CQ) know of my location. As it turned out, my bus arrived at

the last bus transfer just as the driver was tightening the last lug nut on his tire. He had fixed a flat. He drove me to my Camp where I signed the CQ Report.

The next morning, I reported to the 1SG. My Squad followed me just to hear the exchange. Marching into the CP with my entourage, I announced "1SG, I'm back!" The 1SG, not looking up said "Davis, you're AWOL!"

My response was off the top of my head "No, I'm not AWOL, Soldiers get a 24 hour period of grace, and if you look at the CQ Report, I signed in at 2345 hours! Shoot 1SG, I had a whole 15 minutes to spare!"

Everyone was guffawing, even my Platoon Sergeant had a big grin on his face. The 1SG was looking around, and grumpily said "Everybody clear out of my house!" Not an official word was said to me, and my story was worth several free beers during the next few days. 3 months later I topped the Battalion Promotion Board to become an E5, just before the USS Pueblo was captured.

My next assignment was to Germany, where I got to tour Europe!
